



Chloé Kiffer, violin



Violinist Chloé Kiffer, native of France, has received enthusiastic praise by The New York Times for her "pure and beautiful tone" and The Greenwich Sentinel for being "...a star in every sense: performance, exquisite technique and beauty".

Performing solo and orchestra engagements across Europe, North and South America, the Middle East, and Asia, Kiffer has appeared at the Théâtre des Champs-Élysées in Paris, Beethoven Hall in Bonn, Frankfurt Radio Symphony Hall, Tel Aviv Opera, and Beijing National Center. In October 2015, Kiffer made her Carnegie Hall

debut performing Tchaikovsky's Violin Concerto in Stern Auditorium. Kiffer has collaborated alongside Philippe Muller, Shmuel Ashkenasi, Timothy Eddy, the Emerson String Quartet, and pianist Alexandre Moutouzkine.

Ms. Kiffer is on the faculties of the Manhattan School of Music and the University of North Texas. Her students have received high praise for their performances and won prizes at national and international competitions.

Kiffer is a sought-after guest teacher and faculty member for conservatories and festivals around the world—Heifetz International Music Institute, Miami Music Festival, Beijing International Music Festival and Academy, Chamber Music International in Texas, MusicFest Perugia and MusicAlps (France).

Kiffer is a laureate of the Bleustein-Blanchet Foundation. She graduated from the Conservatoire National Supérieur de Musique de Paris and earned postgraduate degrees from the Manhattan School of Music under Patinka Kopec and Pinchas Zukerman. Kiffer received her Doctor of Musical Arts degree from Stony Brook University. Her teachers include Hagai Shaham, Philip Setzer, Joshua Epstein and Rodion Zamuruev.

In 2019, she released an album of the Ravel Violin Sonatas on the Steinway & Sons label with pianist Alexandre Moutouzkine. Chloé Kiffer performs on a Samuel Zygmuntowicz violin (Brooklyn, N.Y., 2015)

GUEST ARTIST PROFILE

Fry Street Quartet



Touring music of the masters alongside exciting new works from visionary composers, the remarkable Fry Street Quartet has perfected a "blend of technical precision and scorching spontaneity" (The Strad). Hailed as "a triumph of ensemble playing" by the New York Times, the quartet has reached audiences from Carnegie Hall to London and Sarajevo to Jerusalem, exploring the medium of

the string quartet and its life-affirming potential with "profound understanding...depth of expression, and stunning technical astuteness" (Deseret Morning News). In 2018, the FSQ presented a complete Bartok Cycle over three days in the Russell Wanlass Performance Hall at Utah State University, featuring eminent Bartok scholar Peter Laki.

In addition to collaborations with acclaimed instrumentalists (including Joseph Kalichstein, Wu Han, Paul Katz, Donald Weilerstein, Misha Dichter, Andres Cardenes and Roger Tapping, among others), the Fry Street Quartet has commissioned and toured new works by a wide range of composers. Pandemonium! by Brazilian composer Clarice Assad received its Fry Street premiere with the San Jose Chamber Orchestra; Michael Ellison's Fiddlin' was co-commissioned by the Arizona Friends of Chamber Music Series and the Salt Lake City based NOVA series; and both Laura Kaminsky's Rising Tide and Libby Larsen's Emergence were commissioned especially for the quartet's global sustainability initiative, The Crossroads Project: Rising Tide.

The quartet's significant touring history includes performances at major venues, festivals, and for distinguished series such as Carnegie Hall and the Schneider Series at the New School in New York, the Jewel Box series in Chicago, Chamber Music Columbus, the Kravis Center in West Palm Beach, the DiBartolo Performing Arts Center at Notre Dame, the Theosophical Society in London, and the Mozart Gemeinde in Klagenfurt, Austria. The Fry Street Quartet is pleased to hold the Dan C. and Manon Caine Russell Endowed String Quartet Residency at the Caine College of the Arts at Utah State University. frystreetquartet.com

GUEST ARTIST PROFILE

Amit Peled, cello



Praised by The Stradmagazine and The New York Times, internationally renowned cellist Amit Peled is acclaimed as one of the most exciting and virtuosic instrumentalists on the concert stage today. Having performed in many of the world's most prestigious venues, including Carnegie Hall and Alice Tully Hall atLincoln Center in New York, the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts in Washington D.C., Salle Gaveau in Paris, Wigmore Hall in London, and the Konzerthaus Berlin, Peled has released over a dozen recordings on the Naxos, Centaur, Delos, and CTM Classics labels. Musical Americanamed Peled one of the Top 30 Influencers of 2015.

Career highlights include Bach Suite cycles in the United States, Europe, and Israel; performances of the Saint-Saëns Cello Concerto at the Kennedy Center; a debut collaboration with the Peabody Chamber Orchestra led by Maestra Marin Alsop; a return to the Ravinia Festival in celebration of Peled's recording of the Brahms Cello Sonatas on the Goffriller cello (1733) once owned by the legendary cellist Pablo Casals; a return visit as a soloist to the Casals Festival in Puerto Rico; performances of the Shostakovich Cello Concerto and Penderecki's Second Cello Concerto conducted by the legendary Krzysztof Penderecki himself; Schubert's Arpeggione Sonata recorded on the Casalscello; and a South-America tour. Sponsored by the March of the Living Foundation, Peled performed for the 75th anniversary of the liberation of Auschwitz at the Krakow Philharmonic Hall, Jewish Cultural Center and at Auschwitz in front of a crowd of 20,000 people.

An enthusiastic chamber music artist, Peled is a member of the acclaimed Tempest Trio with violinist Ilya Kaler and pianist Alon Goldstein. Peled also performs with Goldstein and clarinetist Alexander Fiterstein as a member of the Goldstein-Peled-Fiterstein Trio.

One of the most sought-after cello educators in the world, Peled is a professor at the Peabody Institute at Johns Hopkins University where he has taught since 2003 and was one of the youngest professors ever hired by a major conservatory. He has instructed students who have gone on to garner top prizes at international competitions such as the Carlos Prieto International Competition in Mexico, the Schoenefeld International Competition in China, and Young Concert Artists Guild in New York. 
Peled established the Amit Peled Online Cello Academy in order to reach cellists all over the world with private lessons and in-depth courses on his First Hour technique method.

Peled is also the founder, conductor, and artistic director of the Mount Vernon Virtuosi, a chamber orchestra dedicated to nurturing the careers of recently graduated music students, which annually performs in the Baltimore-Washington area.

Raised on a kibbutz in Israel, Amit Peled began playing the cello at age 10. From 2012 through 2018, Peled performed on the Pablo Casals 1733 Goffriller cello, which was loaned to him personally by Casals' widow, Marta Casals Istomin.

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LOWER BOOKS CONCERT INSTRUCTIONS

Concert Dress - Sunday Best - NO jeans or sneakers

All students should arrive in the auditorium at 12:35 p.m. for tuning and set up.

Cases should be left with parents, if possible, or the cafeteria.

All instruments will have marked seating in the auditorium.

Bass will be on stage the entire concert.

Trumpet & Guitar will be set up on stage before the concert begins. They will return to marked sections in the audience when they are finished performing.

Violinists will be seated by classes.

Violists will be in the hallway and backstage. They will stay on the stage for the entire concert after entering.

Book 1 Cellists* will be seated in the north corner of the auditorium **Book 2-3 Cellists*** will be in the hallway by the stage door. They will stay on the stage for the rest of the concert.

Book 3 Cellists* will be in the north wings backstage. Chairs will be set up for them on the audience floor.

*Cellists should bring cellos, bows, chairs and rockstops clearly labeled with student's names. Small cello chairs will be set up by stage crew and parents. Rockstops or endpin straps are a necessity!

Rebekah Blackner is from Salt Lake City, Utah. She grew up attending ISSI each summer! Inspired by the Fry Street Quartet during Chamber Days, she attended Utah State University where she earned a BM in Violin Performance. She served as Assistant Director of USU String Academy and as an Adjunct Violin Instructor at USU. She later earned an MM in Violin Performance from the University of Utah, performing in the Honors String Quartet and New Music Ensemble. In 2013, she moved

to Austin, Texas, to teach with the University of Texas String Project. Rebekah also taught at Austin Chamber Music Center, Austin SoundWaves, and Monarch Suzuki Academy. While in Austin, she performed with the Austin Opera, the Texas Baroque Ensemble, Tectractys New Music, and the San Antonio Symphony, among others. Rebekah has a thriving private violin studio in Salt Lake City and performs as a freelance musician with ensembles such as Ballet West. As a studio recording musician for commercials, movies, and video games, her students have loved to hear that she recorded for Minecraft! When Rebekah isn't teaching or performing, she loves spending time with her niece, Lula, catching up on pop culture, listening to podcasts, and riding her bike.



Alicia Casey is an internationally sought-after Suzuki educator and concert violinist originally hailing from Australia. Alicia directs the Suzuki Program at the Upper Valley Music Center, where she has taught since 2010, and oversees a program of 120 students in cello, viola, and violin.

Alicia has been a guest clinician at the Suzuki Institute of Indonesia, the Vermont Suzuki Violin Workshops, the Green Mountain Suzuki Summer Institute and the Hartt Workshops. Alicia has been published in the

American Suzuki Journal and has presented at national conferences. She has registered formal Suzuki training with the Suzuki Association of the Americas in Violin Books 1-10 and was awarded the Certificate of Achievement from the Suzuki Association of the Americas in 2018.

Having started violin at age 3, Alicia has now experienced all three sides of the Suzuki triangle. Alicia received her Bachelor of Music Performance and Pedagogy from the Queensland Conservatorium of Music in Australia, where she was a student of Elizabeth Morgan, and her Masters in Violin Performance from the University of Massachusetts Amherst, where she was a student of Elizabeth Chang and was a recipient of the Lark Chamber Music Award. Alicia has performed with orchestras, quartets and as a soloist



throughout the United States, Australia and Europe. Alicia currently lives in New Hampshire with her husband Ben, daughter Elizabeth, and son Jack.



Susan Crawford teaches violin and viola at Carleton College and is on the Suzuki faculty for both MacPhail Center For Music and Northern Lights School for Strings in Minnesota's Twin Cities. After many rewarding music festival experiences as a participant, Susan is delighted to be a frequent clinician at institutes and workshops fulfilling her dream of furthering talent education. Her students have won many awards and are continuing their studies at programs including

Juilliard, Northwestern and Oberlin. She is a member of Minnesota Sinfonia, has been the concertmaster for the Ordway Music Theater's Broadway series for many years, and enjoys an active freelance career.

Ruth Ann Godfrey received her Bachelor of Music in violin performance from San Francisco State and her Master of Music from the University of Arizona. Her career has taken her from California where she was a member of the Santa Rosa and Sacramento Symphony orchestras to the Tucson Symphony and then Rome, Italy where she played for the Teatro dell' Opera for nine years. William performs on the 1732 "Arkwright Lady Rebecca Sylvan" Antonio Stradivari, and on a violin bow by Francois Xavier Tourte, both on generous loan from the Rachel Barton Pine Foundation.



Helen Higa comes from a family with 3 generations of Japanese and Western music teachers, and was born and raised in Honolulu. Her Suzuki Teacher Training includes study with Dr. Shinichi Suzuki for 2.5 years at the Talent Education Institute in Matsumoto, Japan, where she received her Teacher Certification from him in 1973. She continued her Suzuki Teacher Training at the University of Tennessee with William Starr, and Louise Behrend at the School for Strings. From 1990 -1998,

she also taught with Hiroko Primrose who founded the Suzuki Violin Program at Punahou Music School.

In 1983, Helen became a Certified Teacher of the Alexander Technique at the American Center for the Alexander Technique in NYC. Hiroko Driver-Lippman and Helen, gave a joint SAA Heritage Night Keynote Presentation can 2006 called, "Okagesamade (in your honorable shadow) Suzuki Sensei". During the SAA Conference in 2018, Helen was one of the panelists to give a presentation entitled, "To Study is to Change".

Helen currently serves as the Director of Punahou Music School's Suzuki Violin Program, (www.stehawaii.org), and is a part-time member of the Hawaii Symphony.



Jakob Hofer is the violin instructor and director of the Camerata Orchestra at Southern Virginia University. As a founding member of the Rosco String Quartet he won first place in MTNA's National Chamber Music Competition and was a finalist in the American Prize Competition. Jakob has received instruction from many of the world's most renowned chamber musicians including members of the Takacs, Juilliard, Emerson, Tokyo, and Muir String Quartets, and studied many

With 45 years of violin teaching and thousands of students passing through her hands, Sylvia maintained her passion in teaching and produced outstanding string players, many of whom served as concert masters/mistresses, and principal chair of the Singapore National Youth Orchestra, winners of local and international music competition, high distinctions/ scorers in the ABRSM final grade exams. Her advanced students have been accepted into highly regarded conservatories like Peabody, Curtis, Juilliard, Eastman, Northwestern, Berklee, Manhattan and Mannes.

Once an eager Suzuki student herself, **Nonie Reesor** has now trained young Suzuki students for two decades. Nonie thanks her early teachers, Ramona Stirling and Jack Ashton, for nurturing her love of the violin and preparing her to earn a degree in violin performance from Utah State University in 2004. And she thanks her Suzuki teacher trainers for inspiring in her a love of teaching students through the beautifully connective Suzuki philosophy. Nonie has served as adjunct

lecturer at USU (2006–2008), artistic director for the USU String Academy (2006–2008), on the faculty of Suzuki Talent Education of Pasadena (2008–2016), and concertmaster of the Rockbridge Symphony (2016–2023) while she also directed Shenandoah Strings in the Blue Ridge Mountains of Virginia. Now having left her beloved Virginia for her native Utah, Nonie continues to teach and perform, and loves having so many close Suzuki colleagues! Koen Rens, started violin lessons as a Suzuki student with Jeanne Janssens in Turnhout, Belgium. Later on, as a student of Dirk Lippens, he won the degree of excellence in the Conservatorium of Bruges, where he made his debut as a soloist with orchestra. He then studied at the Royal Conservatory of Music in Brussels and won first prizes in violin and chamber music in 1989, studying with Katalyn Sébèstyen and Guido De Neve. After long term teacher training with Jeanne Janssens

obtained the final diploma of the European Suzuki Association in Suzuki pedagogy in 1992.

He played with the chamber orchestra of the European Community, the Sallinen String quartet and the Rubens piano trio, and with the folk band Galley Head. He was appointed as a Teacher Trainer for ESA in 2000.

In 2002 he went to study violin, psychology and pedagogy in the Conservatoire Royal de Liège and got the final diploma in 2003 with a thesis on the development of autonomy in Suzuki-trained students.

Koen Rens has a thriving studio for over' 30 years now and is teaching violin and conducting the Symphony Orchestra at the Academy of Music in Turnhout, Belgium. He has been invited to teach and perform in most European countries, South Africa, Mexico, Canada, United States, Japan, Taiwan and Australia. Since 2015 he also trains teachers for the Catalonian Suzuki Association in Barcelona (Spain). He serves on the Faculty of the AP Royal Conservatory of music in Antwerpen teaching a Postgraduate Course in Suzuki

Pedagogy, in collaboration with Veerle Van Gorp and Wim Meuris.



Carrie Salisbury is a Los Angeles-based performer, business owner, and violin/viola teacher. She created StringsPop, a music theory enrichment experience for teens and tweens, and offers innovative courses on Creative Music Literacy. Carrie holds a B.M. in Viola performance and now studies orchestral repertoire and pedagogy with Dr. Mick Wetzel. A Suzuki teacher of 20+ years, she directs the SMAC Los Angeles Branch. Her private students perform regularly as Crescendo Strings,

an all-ages multi-level string group and as First Inversion, a premiere teen ensemble known for creating and performing their own arrangements. She is a parent to three young Suzuki string students with her husband, pianist-composer Benjamin Salisbury.

Nicolette Solomon is the Director of the Monticello Talent Education School of Music in Dripping Springs , Texas. She was the Executive Director and President of the Suzuki Music Institute of Dallas for 20 years and has taught violin, viola, chamber music and conducted string orchestras for over 40 years.

Ms. Solomon was born in Laingsburg, South Africa to musician parents. She began her violin studies with Neil McKay, followed by Pierre de Groote at the College of Music in Cape Town and her University studies under the tutelage of Alan Solomon. During that time, she taught at a private studio in Nagano City, Japan and at Shinshu University.

In 1994, Ms. Solomon attended the International Strings workshop in France, playing in the Eduard Melckus Baroque Ensemble. She has taught at workshops and Institutes in South Africa, Ireland, New Zealand and throughout the USA and Central America. Her studio in Dripping Springs comprises of violinists and violists ranging from 4 year old beginners to College level students. She is married to Carl van Wyk, has 2 adult children and two grandchildren, Leonardo and Julia. She loves gardening, architecture, hiking, film, reading, art. food and wines.



Wilfried Van Gorp started his Suzuki violin lessons in 1971 in Turnhout with Jeanne Janssen. He had the luck to grow up with the first generation of European Suzuki Teachers, besides his own teacher Jeanne Janssens. As one of the first Suzuki students in Europe, he obtained his professional diploma in violin and chamber music at the Royal Conservatory for Music in Brussels. For many years he played in different chamber orchestra's, but being a Suzuki teacher became his

passion and it is still... never ending. Since 1987 he is Suzuki violin teacher in Turnhout at the academie for music and he teaches also in Leuven.

As teacher, speaker or member of jury he has been invited to attempt at national and international workshops, in Europe (as Poland, Spain, Finland, Great Britain, Switserland, Sweden, Ireland, Denmark, UK, Italie, France, etc.) as well in Amerika and Australia. After graduation, Domenick free-lanced in the Philadelphia and New York City areas, performing in Broadway shows, The Brooklyn Philharmonia, National Ballet of Canada, and the Duke Ellington Orchestra, as well as playing electric bass for

Philadelphia Orchestra Pops Concerts. He earned a Bachelor of Music Education degree from West Chester (Pa.) University in 1987 and began teaching in the Ephrata, Pa. School District. Pedro Azevedo received his Master in music from UNICAMP (2017), bachelor in music with qualification in trumpet from Faculdade Santa Marcelina (2012) and with a degree in Music teacher license from Faculdade Claretiano (2022). He began his musical studies at the age of 9 at the Escola de Música da Banda Musical de Peruíbe (1998 -2002).

He was a music teacher at AMIC – Amigos da Criança from 2013 to 2017, and since 2018 he has been a music teacher at Múltiplo International School in Campinas/SP, trumpet teacher and SECE teacher at Centro Suzuki de Campinas since 2017, and one of the coordinators of the Music in Early Childhood Project (AMIC – Amigos da Criança) since 2017. Since 2020, he has been on the board of directors of AMSBrasil (Associação Musical Suzuki do Brasil).



Natalie DeJong is a performer and teacher living close to the mountains near Calgary, Canada. Dr. Sokol – Borup was also leading the effort to design a MM degree in String Performance and Pedagogy at The U of U, which was implemented in 2012. Graduates from this program have been successfully employed in positions around the country.

Dr. Sokol – Borup is an active chamber musician, she performs solo concerts and gives clinics. Her clinics, master classes and lectures focus on violin technique, teaching the violin, leading sting group classes and youth orchestras. She has trained and worked with teachers in the United States and in Europe at festivals such as the Moab Music Festival and Saarburg Festival, Germany.

Dr. Sokol – Borup lives in Salt Lake City with her husband – violinist, Hasse Borup and their two children Sophia and Christopher. She plays on a violin made by luthier Ryan Soltis in 2008.

The FSQ's career was launched when the group received a three year "Rural Residency" grant from the National Endowment for the Arts, as well as invitations from the late Isaac Stern to give their Carnegie Hall debut. 20+ years later, and the FSQ continues to enjoy a busy concertizing schedule alongside their dedicated teaching career.

Notable projects include Rising Tide: The Crossroads Project, an ongoing performance piece with physicist and educator Dr. Robert Davies which has had more than 60 performances in 3 different countries. Notable commissions for the quartet include works from composers Laura Kaminsky, Libby Larsen, Gabriela Lena Frank, and Nicolas Lell Benavides.



Based in Los Angeles, California, composer and violinist **Michael McLean** is an internationally noted composer, violinist, and pedagogue. He has taught for 30 + years at Music Institute of Chicago, Texas Christian University and the Colburn School. He received his B.M. in Violin Performance from Northwestern University where he studied violin, composition, counterpoint, and orchestration extensively. Many of his students in violin, viola and composition have gone on to study

at the major music schools and conservatories across the country. Michael also received a degree from the University of Southern California in "Scoring for Motion Pictures and Television". Mr. McLean is a popular guest clinician at workshops and institutes throughout the country internationally. He is an active string player in orchestral and chamber ensembles throughout the year.



Bradley Ottesen is the violist of the internationally acclaimed Fry Street Quartet. He holds the position of Professor of Viola and Chamber Music at Utah State University, and currently serves as the President of the Utah Viola Society.

Professor Ottesen holds degrees from Northwestern University and the New England Conservatory, and his principal teachers included

William Preucil, James Dunham, and Peter Slowik, with further mentorship from cellist Bernard Greenhouse, violinist Eric Rosenblith, and members of the Juilliard, Muir, and Cleveland string quartets. His early orchestral career included extensive training with the

Emmett Drake is currently the Director of Orchestras at Hall and Conard High Schools in West Hartford, CT, as well as the Department Chair for Large Ensembles at the Hartt School Community Division (University of Hartford) where he conducts four youth orchestras.

Mr. Drake has had many engagements as a guest conductor/clinician. His recent appearances include the Hartford Symphony Orchestra (CT),

Farmington Valley Symphony Orchestra (CT), the Suzuki Youth Orchestra of the Americas (MN), TMEA Region 2 Orchestra (TX), Broward County All County Gold Orchestra (FL), the Fairfield County String Festival (CT), CMEA Eastern and Southern Regional Festivals (CT), Massachusetts Western District Orchestra Festival (MA), Westchester All County Youth Orchestra (NY), Ithaca Suzuki Institute (NY), and Hartt Suzuki Institute (CT).
