GUEST ARTIST PROFILE

Fry Street Quartet



Touring music of the masters alongside exciting new works from visionary composers, the remarkable Fry Street Quartet has perfected a "blend of technical precision and scorching spontaneity" (The Strad). Hailed as "a triumph of ensemble playing" by the New York Times, the quartet has reached audiences from Carnegie Hall to London and Sarajevo to Jerusalem, exploring the medium of

the string quartet and its life-affirming potential with "profound understanding...depth of expression, and stunning technical astuteness" (Deseret Morning News). In 2018, the FSQ presented a complete Bartok Cycle over three days in the Russell Wanlass Performance Hall at Utah State University, featuring eminent Bartok scholar Peter Laki.

In addition to collaborations with acclaimed instrumentalists (including Joseph Kalichstein, Wu Han, Paul Katz, Donald Weilerstein, Misha Dichter, Andres Cardenes and Roger Tapping, among others), the Fry Street Quartet has commissioned and toured new works by a wide range of composers. Pandemonium! by Brazilian composer Clarice Assad received its Fry Street premiere with the San Jose Chamber Orchestra; Michael Ellison's Fiddlin' was co-commissioned by the Arizona Friends of Chamber Music Series and the Salt Lake City based NOVA series; and both Laura Kaminsky's Rising Tide and Libby Larsen's Emergence were commissioned especially for the quartet's global sustainability initiative, The Crossroads Project: Rising Tide.

The quartet's significant touring history includes performances at major venues, festivals, and for distinguished series such as Carnegie Hall and the Schneider Series at the New School in New York, the Jewel Box series in Chicago, Chamber Music Columbus, the Kravis Center in West Palm Beach, the DiBartolo Performing Arts Center at Notre Dame, the Theosophical Society in London, and the Mozart Gemeinde in Klagenfurt, Austria. The Fry Street Quartet is pleased to hold the Dan C. and Manon Caine Russell Endowed String Quartet Residency at the Caine College of the Arts at Utah State University. frystreetquartet.com

Albers Trio



The Albers Trio is a string trio composed of the Albers sisters: Julie (cellist), Laura (violinist), and Rebecca (violist). They are all accomplished musicians with solo careers and have performed with major orchestras and in various chamber music festivals

Julie Albers is a cellist who currently holds the principal cellist position with the St. Paul Chamber Orchestra. She also performs with the Cortona Trio and regularly participates in chamber music festivals. Julie is known for her "radiant performing style and intense musicianship". She was awarded the Grand Prize at the XIII International Competition for Young Musicians in Douai, France.

Laura Albers is a violinist and the Associate Concertmaster of the San Francisco Opera. She also studied at the Cleveland Institute of Music and The Juilliard School. Laura is a Colorado native who began Suzuki violin studies at age two.

Rebecca Albers is the Principal Viola of the Minnesota Orchestra. She also studied at Juilliard and has performed throughout the United States, Asia, and Europe. Rebecca joined the Minnesota Orchestra as assistant principal viola in 2010 and won the position of principal viola in 2017.

The sisters have noted that their strong familial bond translates to a strong artistic connection, allowing them to intuitively understand and anticipate each other's musical intentions. They regularly play together, and their shared musical passion and love for each other are what keep them performing.

GUEST ARTIST PROFILE

Caleb Hudson, trumpet



Caleb Hudson, trumpet, has been a member of Canadian Brass for 10 years. Originally from Kentucky, Hudson graduated from The Juilliard School with both Bachelor and Master of Music degrees. Acclaimed by The New York Times as 'brilliantly stylish,' Hudson performs as an international soloist, including a recital that was broadcast nationally on NPR's Performance Today.

Hudson is known for his mastery of Bach's infamous Brandenburg Concerto No. 2, and has performed it around the world with ensembles including Philadelphia Orchestra, Orpheus Chamber Orchestra, Orchestra of St. Luke's, Israel Philharmonic Soloists,

Chamber Music Society of Lincoln Center, and Handel and Haydn Society. Hudson has also performed with early music ensembles such as Philharmonia Baroque, Trinity Baroque Orchestra, American Bach Soloists, and the American Classical Orchestra.

Possessing a wide range of musical styles, his experience ranges from soloing in Carnegie Hall to appearing on Jimmy Kimmel Live! His orchestral experience includes guest principal trumpet with the Philadelphia Orchestra as well as performing with the Seattle Symphony and New York City Ballet. He is an alumnus of Interlochen Arts Academy and Ensemble Connect, a fellowship program of Carnegie Hall. Recently, Hudson was selected as the recording artist for the Suzuki Trumpet School, Volume I, published by Alfred Music, endorsed by the International Suzuki Association and the first of its kind for trumpet.

Hudson is also an avid writer and arranger. In 2015, his original composition "White Rose Elegy" was premiered at Lincoln Center by the Canadian Brass and New York Philharmonic Principal Brass.


Hudson is Associate Professor of Trumpet at the Butler School of Music, University of Texas at Austin. Previously, he held positions at the University of North Texas and Colorado State University.

Hudson resides in Texas with his wife Amanda and their three children.



GUEST ARTIST PROFILE

Ahmed Alom, piano



Ahmed Alom is a pianist, composer, and conductor whose artistry bridges classical and popular traditions, earning him recognition as "one of the most versatile artists in the Western Hemisphere" (Diario de Mallorca). His unique voice blends the rigor and structure of classical training with the rhythmic and harmonic richness of his Cuban heritage, forging connections between the past and the music of today.

Alom's compositions have been performed by worldrenowned musicians, including Yuja Wang, who premiered his Displaced Etude No. 1 at the New York Philharmonic. As a soloist, he has appeared with the Baltimore Symphony Orchestra, Indianapolis Symphony Orchestra, Louisville

Orchestra, New World Symphony, Orquesta Filarmónica de México, and Britt Festival Orchestra. He is also the youngest Artistic Director of the Washington Square Music Festival, where he champions inclusive and innovative programming, premiering works by Julian de la Chica, Dante Cucurullo, Dick Hyman among others,

Deeply engaged in collaboration, Alom works across genres with leading artists such as Michael League, Antonio Sánchez, Teddy Abrams, Steve Hackman, Miguel Zenón, Mark Dover, Brandon Ridenour and Pedrito Martinez. His debut album, Exilio (2023), explored themes of displacement through the works of six Hispanic composers, including the first complete recording of Luis A. Calvo's Four Intermezzos. His chamber trio, Triple Cortado—with Caleb Hudson and Achilles Liarmakopoulos—blends classical virtuosity with new contemporary works, while his duo CrossCurrents with Pedrito Martinez navigates the intersection of Afro-Cuban music and European classical traditions.

Beyond the stage, Alom is a sought-after educator, having given masterclasses and lectures at Berklee College of Music, the San Francisco Conservatory, Dartmouth College, Peabody Institute, and the National Jazz Museum in Harlem. His passion for new music has led to collaborations with visionary composers and projects, including performances with Steve Hackman, the Pedro Giraudo Tango Quartet, and Ballet Hispánico's Doña Perón.

Born in Cuba, Alom trained in both piano and percussion before earning his Bachelor of Music from the Manhattan School of Music under Dr. Solomon Mikowsky. He continues his studies in conducting and composition with Dr. Ford Lallerstedt while actively expanding his artistic collaborations worldwide.

Rachel Barton Pine, violin



The acclaimed American concert violinist Rachel Barton Pine thrills international audiences with her dazzling technique, lustrous tone, and emotional honesty. With an infectious joy in music-making and a passion for connecting historical research to performance, Pine transforms audiences' experiences of classical music. She is a leading interpreter of the great classical masterworks as well as groundbreaking contemporary music.

Pine performs with the world's foremost orchestras, including the Philadelphia Orchestra, the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra, Camerata Salzburg, and the Chicago, Vienna, and Detroit symphony orchestras. She has worked with renowned conductors that

include Teddy Abrams, Marin Alsop, Daniel Barenboim, Semyon Bychkov, Neeme Järvi, Christoph Eschenbach, Erich Leinsdorf, Nicholas McGegan, Zubin Mehta, Tito Muñoz, and John Nelson. As a chamber musician, Pine has performed with Jonathan Gilad, Clive Greensmith, Paul Neubauer, Jory Vinikour, William Warfield, Orion Weiss, and the Pacifica and Parker quartets.

Highlights of Pine's 2024–25 season include the Chicago Symphony Orchestra premiere of José White's Violin Concerto in F-sharp Minor; a tour of Israel with the Tel Aviv Soloists Ensemble; Lalo's Symphonie Espagnole with the Puerto Rico Symphony Orchestra; the world premiere of Haralabos [Harry] Stafylakis' Violin Concerto with the Winnipeg Symphony; Billy Childs' Violin Concerto No. 2 with the Rhode Island Philharmonic; and the French premiere of Earl Maneein's violin concerto Dependent Arising with the Orchestre National de Bretagne. Over the season, Pine will also perform concertos by Brahms and Sibelius, in addition to other notable works by Wynton Marsalis, Jessie Montgomery, and Mark O'Connor, among other living composers.

She performs on the "ex-Bazzini, ex-Soldat" Joseph Guarnerius "del Gesù" (Cremona 1742), on lifetime loan from an anonymous patron.

Concert Dress - Sunday Best - NO jeans or sneakers

All students should arrive in the auditorium at 12:30 p.m. for tuning and set up.

Cases should be left with parents, if possible, or the cafeteria.

All instruments will have marked seating in the auditorium.

Bass will be on stage the entire concert.

Trumpet & Guitar will be set up on stage before the concert begins. They will return to marked sections in the audience when they are finished performing.

Violinists will be seated by classes.

Violists will be in the hallway and backstage. They will stay on the stage for the entire concert after entering.

Book 1 Cellists* will be seated in the north corner of the auditorium **Book 2-3 Cellists*** will be in the hallway by the stage door. They will stay on the stage for the rest of the concert.

Book 3 Cellists* will be in the north wings backstage. Chairs will be set up for them on the audience floor.

*Cellists should bring cellos, bows, chairs and rockstops clearly labeled with student's names. Small cello chairs will be set up by stage crew and parents. Rockstops or endpin straps are a necessity!

Rachel Alvarado (TX) serves as Middle School Orchestra Director at St. Andrew's Episcopal School in Austin, Texas. Previously, she served as head orchestra director at Cedar Ridge High School in Round Rock ISD, earning sweepstakes awards at UIL Concert and Sight-Reading Contest. Mrs. Alvarado also maintains a private Suzuki violin and viola studio through the Austin Suzuki Music School and is a regular clinician at Suzuki institutes and music festivals throughout the United States.

Additionally, she conducted the Camerata Orchestra in the Austin Youth Orchestra program and enjoys performing regularly in the Austin area.



Rebekah Blackner (UT) is from Salt Lake City, Utah. She grew up attending ISSI each summer! Inspired by the Fry Street Quartet during Chamber Days, she attended Utah State University where she earned a BM in Violin Performance. She served as Assistant Director of USU String Academy and as an Adjunct Violin Instructor at USU. She later earned an MM in Violin Performance from the University of Utah, performing in the Honors String Quartet and New Music Ensemble.

In 2024, she founded Violapalooza NM, a workshop and concert that brought together 50 professional and student violists from all over the state. Her doctoral research and interest in contemporary works and works by underrepresented composers culminated in two albums of pieces for viola and piano by

the American composers Marion Bauer, Vivian Fine and Miriam Gideon. A portion of this research is published as a "Foreword" to the American Composer Alliance's edition of Miriam Gideons Sonata for Viola and Piano. Dr. Karlstrom's performance of the Marion Bauer Sonata for Viola and Piano, op. 22 was featured on the American Viola Society's "Emerging Artists" recital in 2019. From 2013-2017, she played as a tenured member of the New Mexico Philharmonic viola section. She was a Regents Honor Award winner and graduated on full merit scholarship with a doctoral degree from The Hartt School in 2019.



Born in Penang, **Sylvia Khoo** (Singapore), a much sought after violin teacher, who won her first National piano competition (Malaysia) when she was 15. She subsequently earned her Master of Music in performance and teaching with the internationally acclaimed Suzuki string pedagogue, Mr John Kendall, at the Southern Illinois University, under the Singapore PSC-SSO Scholarship.



Upon her return, she played with the Singapore Symphony Orchestra before embarking on a 40-year teaching career with the Ministry of Education, Singapore. After her stance as a Music Elective Programme (MEP) teacher in Raffles Junior College, Sylvia proceeded to pioneer MEP, covering a wide curriculum of music history, analysis and composition, practical and ensemble playing, ethnic music, etc, in Raffles Girls Secondary School. In addition, her passion in music teaching is evident through her many creative music learning initiatives: establishing a strings ensemble, including dance, handbells, and computer music (which was a breakthrough those days!) With 45 years of violin teaching and thousands of students passing through her hands, Sylvia maintained her passion in teaching and produced outstanding string players, many of whom served as concert masters/mistresses, and principal chair of the Singapore National Youth Orchestra, winners of local and international music competition, high distinctions/scorers in the ABRSM final grade exams. Her advanced

He then studied at the Royal Conservatory of Music in Brussels and won first prizes in violin and chamber music in 1989, studying with Katalyn Sébèstyen and Guido De Neve. After long term teacher training with

Jeanne Janssens obtained the final diploma of the European Suzuki Association in Suzuki pedagogy in 1992.

He serves on the Faculty of the AP Royal Conservatory of music in Antwerpen teaching a Postgraduate Course in Suzuki Pedagogy, in collaboration with Veerle Van Gorp and Wim Meuris.



Robert Richardson (Canada) is the Director of the Suzuki Talent Education Program at Brandon University's Eckhardt-Grammatté Conservatory of Music. While maintaining a studio which includes students on both violin and viola he also conducts string orchestras and coaching chamber music. He is an active clinician teaching at workshops, institutes and festivals throughout North America and beyond. Robert has presented at the Suzuki Association of the

Matt Gold (VA) fell in love with the double bass when he began playing the instrument at the age of nine. He went on to study with John Chiego at the University of Memphis on a full scholarship, and later with the distinguished bass pedagogue Lawrence Hurst at Indiana University, where he earned a Masters Degree in Music Performance. and Stanley Richie, world-renowned Baroque violinist. Natalie DeJong (Canada) performs and teaches close to the mountains near Calgary, Canada. In 2011, Ms. DeJong developed a trumpet class called Funfare for young children, then trained as a Suzuki trumpet teacher in Sweden in 2013. She returned to launch the first Suzuki trumpet program in the Americas at Mount Royal Conservatory in 2014. As a member of the International Suzuki Brass Committee, Natalie was involved with the publication of Suzuki Trumpet School

Volume 1, released in 2020. She is thrilled to be promoting and sharing Suzuki concepts with other trumpet and brass players throughout Canada, the U.S. and beyond, having hosted teacher training courses starting in 2016. Natalie has also been a "Suzuki Parent" and enjoys collaborating with colleagues to deliver Suzuki Parent classes. Natalie holds a Master of Music degree from Rutgers University and has attended music workshops in Alberta, Quebec, Chicago, New Jersey, New York, North Carolina, and Sweden. She has performed with Altius Brass, Calgary Creative Arts Ensemble, Prime Time Big Band, and the Calgary Philharmonic Orchestra. She has played "baroque" trumpet with early music groups Musica Raritana (NJ), Concert Royale (NYC), Swedish Baroque Orchestra (Stockholm), Per Sonatori (Regina), and Kapella Kyrie (Edmonton). Most recently she has been performing with Jens Lindemann in a 'Rhapsody in Blue' big band project and the Calgary Women's Jazz Orchestra.

Ann-Marie Sundberg (Sweden) has developed the Suzuki method for trumpet and is chairman of the ISA Instrument Committee for brass instruments. She is the first Suzuki trumpet teacher in the world and the first and for the moment the only ESA/SAA Suzuki Brass teacher trainer.

Ann-Marie was educated at the Royal College of Music in Stockholm, 1967-72, both as a performer and as a teacher. She has during the years worked as a professional trumpet player in symphony orchestras, with opera, theatre, chamber music and as a soloist. Until 1982 she was principal in Norrköping, one of the professional Symphony Orchestras in Sweden.

Ann-Marie also has a great experience both as an orchestra leader and of teaching brass instruments and has worked at various music schools in Sweden and abroad, and since 1998 also as a teacher trainer at the Royal College of Music where she once studied.

Sienkiewicz's doctoral dissertation, Forefathers, Antecedents, and the Development of Alexander Arutiunian's Big Soviet Armenian Style (2019), is the first in-depth English-language investigation of the Armenian composer. Sienkiewicz has presented on the topic dozens of times at colleges and at the International Trumpet Guild conference.

Hailed as "a triumph of ensemble playing" (New York Times), the FSQ has perfected a "blend of technical precision and scorching spontaneity" (Strad). Prizewinners at the Banff International String Quartet Competition and both the Fischoff and Yellow Springs national chamber music competitions, the FSQ has reached audiences from Carnegie Hall to

Sarajevo and Jerusalem. With the quartet, Anne has recorded a discography ranging from Haydn and Beethoven to Larsen and Rorem.

Anne received her Bachelor of Music degree from the Cleveland Institute of Music, where she studied with Richard Aaron and Alan Harris, and she served as teaching assistant to Paul Katz while pursuing her Master of Music degree at the Shepherd School of Music at Rice University. Alongside her touring schedule with the FSQ, Anne teaches cello and chamber music on the faculty of the Caine College of the Arts at Utah State University, where the quartet holds the Dan C. and Manon Caine Russell endowed string quartet residency. Upon returning to the United States, she became the first teacher to teach Suzuki Violin Method for brain-injured and well children at the Institute for the Achievement of Human Potential in Philadelphia.



In 1983 she and her husband Domenick founded DaCore Talent Education in Glenmore, PA where, for 14 years, she taught violin and directed her own workshops. She has presented student performing groups in Bermuda, Puerto Rico, Europe, and throughout the United States. In 1997 she accepted a teaching position at the Hartt School of Music at the University of Hartford. She was a Suzuki teacher trainer in the graduate degree program there and also taught college students as well as young students in the school's Community Division.

Having returned to PA, Linda and Domenick are currently continuing the development of DaCore Talent Education Academy and Fiore Performing Strings in the Lehigh Valley area. They co-direct Practice Pathways and the Ogontz Suzuki Institute, a two-session Institute in the White Mountains of New Hampshire.

Linda has done extensive orchestra, chamber orchestra, and chamber music performing over the course of her career with groups such as the Lehigh Valley Chamber Orchestra and the Northeastern PA Philharmonic and the Pennsylvania Sinfonia. States, Canada, Mexico, Central America, Europe, Asia, Australia and New Zealand. Residing in New York City, Allen is the Instructor for Violin Teacher-Training and a member of the violin faculty at The School for Strings.



Mark Mutter (MI - violin) is a registered Teacher Trainer with the Suzuki Association of the Americas. He received his Bachelor and Master of Violin Performance studying with Walter Schwede, Angel Reyes and Camilla Wicks. Mark has led the SMA Tour Group on concert tours throughout Europe and Canada as well as two performances in Carnegie Hall. He is presently on the conducting staff of the Civic Youth Ensembles, the Detroit Symphonies youth orchestra program. He conducts the Concert Orchestra and Pizzicato String Ensemble.





Fernando Piñero (Argentina - violin) is the first Spanish speaking Latin American SAA Violin Teacher Trainer. He is the Director of the "Escuela de Musica Shinichi Suzuki" in Córdoba, Argentina. With his students, he has performed in some of the most important concert halls in Argentina. They were invited to France in 2013 and in 2016, where they performed at the Festival Universitaire de Musique in Belfort, as well as in Paris, Venice and Rome. In 2018 the tour included

presentations in the Netherlands, Belgium and the Dr Hoch Konservatorium in Frankfurt. They performed at the 2014 International Conference of ISME (International Society for Music Education), in Brazil. He is also a Violin Teacher Trainer for the European Suzuki Association.

In 2014 he conducted the Latin American Suzuki Ensemble, a group of 40 students from eight different countries that performed at the 2014 SAA Conference in Minneapolis. He was also Conductor of the Copland Orchestra at the 2019 Suzuki Convention in Cancun, Mexico.

As a clinician he has been invited to institutes, workshops and "Festivales" throughout the Americas: Salt Lake City, Ciudad de México, Lima, Bogotá, Buenos Aires, La Paz, Monterrey, Asunción, Brasilia, Guatemala, among many other places. He is also frequently invited in workshops and institutes in Europe: Lithuania, Belgium, Poland, France, Switzerland, Denmark and Spain, among others.

He has organized exchange programs and visits with several Suzuki groups such as Rocky Mountain Strings, the Indiana Virtuosi; The Buffalo Suzuki strings, etc. In 1998 he was country representative from Argentina for the Concert during the Winter Olympics in Nagano and Matsumoto.

Since 1999 he is a member of the Córdoba Symphony Orchestra. He has also been a member of the Orquesta Barroca del Suquia conducted by Manfred Kraemer, as well as other Baroque Music Ensembles.

He holds a degree in Literature with emphasis in Linguistics from the National University of Cordoba.



Elizabeth Stuen-Walker (WA - viola) lives in Bellingham, Washington, where she teaches viola and violin. She received her degrees from the Eastman School of Music and Yale University School of Music. Ms. Stuen-Walker has been an active clinician worldwide, and twice has served on the Board of Directors of the SAA, served on the Teacher Development Advisory Committee, and currently is chair of both the SAA and ISA Viola Committees.

Ann-Marie Sundberg (Sweden - trumpet) has developed the Suzuki method for trumpet and is chairman of the ISA Brass Committee. She is the first Suzuki trumpet teacher in the world and the first and for the moment the only ESA/SAA Suzuki Brass teacher trainer.

Ann-Marie was educated at the Royal College of Music in Stockholm, 1967-72, both as a performer and as a teacher. She has during the

years worked as a professional trumpet player in symphony orchestras, with operas, theatre, chamber music and as a soloist. Until 1982 she was principal in Norrköping, one of the professional Symphony Orchestras in Sweden.

Ann-Marie also has a great experience both as an orchestra leader and of teaching brass instruments and has worked at various music schools in Sweden and abroad, and since 1998 also as a teacher trainer at the Royal College of Music where she once studied.

Recently retired Ann-Marie continues to teach with a clear focus on continuing to develop and spread Suzuki Brass all over the world.

She maintains a cello studio in Ann Arbor, Michigan, where she founded Cellympics, a play-based approach to cello technique acquisition for children. Andrea is one of 40 Suzuki cello teacher trainers in the Americas, and she was hired in 2020 by Paul Katz to be a part of his CelloBello teacher training faculty. In 2020, Andrea was designated Teacher of the Year by the Michigan chapter of the American String Teachers Association. Andrea holds degrees in cello performance, music education, and mathematics from Indiana University and the University of Michigan.

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
